Philosophy Credit/Educational Background Evaluation

In keeping with the requirements of *Sapientia Christiana*, the Roman pontifical universities require a seminarian beginning theological studies to have completed a two-year course of philosophy at an approved institution. In practice, this means that, as a minimum, the seminarian is expected to have earned at least **thirty (30) credit hours covering twelve (12) specific areas of philosophy**, including political philosophy and natural philosophy/ philosophy of science. These last two subjects do not require a separate course, simply that the material has been covered somehow. In this case, a course description will be helpful to demonstrate that the seminarian has covered this material. If the seminarian has not taken courses that cover all the material listed below in the Philosophy Worksheet, he is required to complete these studies before his theological studies in Rome.

In addition, the universities have different requirements for ancient languages.

- -The Gregorian requires all first cycle students to take three semesters of ancient languages, regardless of their level of competency. The seminarian may test into a higher level of Latin and/or Greek.
- -Santa Croce requires all first cycle students take two semesters of Latin and one semester of Greek, and one semester of Hebrew. The seminarian may test into a higher level of these classes.
- -The Angelicum expects all students to have a proficiency in Latin upon application to the university, typically comprised by four semesters of Latin. If the seminarian does not have this level of proficiency, he is able to take additional courses to achieve this. The Angelicum does not offer Greek or Hebrew as part of its regular course of studies.
